



Fellow Noble Yachtsmen and Mariners, as the year 2013 is drawing to a close, a small number of members still have not paid dues for this year. You have been notified and have not responded. In the past we continued in good faith to communicate with you by mailing you The Yachtsman. However, with the rising cost of postage and printing, this is no longer feasible. All members who have not paid their dues will be suspended as of December 31, 2013. Please look at your Dues Card for the vear in which it was intended. We value your membership and want you with us. Note: 2014 Dues Invoices will be mailed out shortly. Please respond in a reasonable and timely manner.

Now, on to other matters: During the year a Financial Committee was appointed consisting of a PIC (Chet Dunn), The Treasurer (me) and a member of the Bridge (Bill Kennedy, IASYC Rear Commodore). The marching orders for the Committee were to review all IASYC financial matters and to report same to the IASYC Commodore for action. This year, this included the repositioning of several growth Funds held to cover specific costs such as those associated with Life Memberships, etc. It was recommended that such Funds be consolidated into one fund. The Commodore, along with members of the Bridge, is currently reviewing this matter and will make a full report with the appropriate recommendations for voting at the next IASYC Business Meeting in Tampa in Feb., 2014.



An other major matter to be reviewed is to make sure that all our financial procedures are in line with all current Imperial Bi-laws, as well as IASYC Bi-laws.

- 1. We now refer to our white cotton shirt as an Aviator Shirt....it's a trade thing.
- 2. We do our best to maintain a minimum of inventory in order to keep our cost of goods at a minimum. At the same time, we recognize that as we grow (note the large numbers of Hadi club members who just joined IASYC) our inventory will have to grow as well. We assure you we are doing our best to keep our costs in line.
- 3. While we currently have an adequate supply of Application forms, we do not want to duplicate efforts; i.e., the true control point for forms is at the Port Captain level. While District Commodores and Regional Ambassadors need some copies for promotion purposes, it's the Port Captains who should have enough forms for all prospective members of his club or unit. If you don't have enough, email me and I will make sure they are mailed to you promptly!
- 4. Finally, the Winter Cruise cost is a "steal"! Make it a second Honey Moon for you and your honey!


At this past year's Winter Meeting held in San Juan, PR discussions were held regarding the responsibilities and duties of IASYC Ambassadors, whether they be at the Region, State or local Shrine Center level. They are among the most important of any appointed office in the International Association of Shrine Yacht Clubs or Mariner Marching Units. This is so because they are the ones most likely to meet directly with the actual IASYC membership. The success of this organization depends for the most part directly on them because they will be the ones most affecting attitudes toward all IASYC endeavors. The total organization will grow or die based primarily on their efforts.

We should always remember that IASYC does not involve itself in any way with the operations of any Shrine Yacht Club or Mariner Marching Unit. We are a service organization only. We are a communications hub between all Shrine Yacht Clubs. We collect information on successful local club promotions and publish such information throughout the world so that all clubs can, if desired, use these ideas to enhance their own opportunities to attract new members and increase their fund raising activities, so as to provide greater financial aid to Shrine Children's Hospitals.

Regional Ambassador Duties:

- 1. Maintain primary contact with all State Ambassadors and all Temple Secretaries
- 2. Maintain secondary contact with all Temple Potentates.
- 3. Via State Ambassadors, distribute appropriate communications including (but not limited to) Application Forms, Newsletters, Bulletins, Brochures, Films, Videos and the like, as directed by the IASYC Commodore *via the IASYC Fleet Captain*.
- 4. Collect all pertinent information available from State Ambassadors including (but not limited to) Club/Unit New Membership promotions and Fund Raising Drives; such information to be communicated via the "Yachtsman" to all other Clubs/Units for their possible use.
- 5. In cooperation with State Ambassadors, determine which Temple Centers do not currently have a IASYC Yacht Club/Mariner Marching Unit and provide assistance to those Temple Centers who will consider establishing same. This assistance would also be offered to those Centers who have Yacht Clubs who have real needs in retaining their viability.
- 6. Via State Ambassadors, be responsible for notifying the IASYC Secretary on all deaths, demits and changes of address of all members in their respective State's established Yacht Clubs/Units.
- 7. In-so-far-as-possible, communicate frequently with all State Ambassadors via email, phone, Skype conference calls and, where possible, personal visitations to discuss matters of mutual importance and, where necessary, relay this information to the IASYC Fleet Captain. [It is the IASYC Fleet Captain's responsibility to report such information to the IASYC Commodore]. [District Commodores and Port Captain Duties appear in the spring Yachtsman].
