


KIDS ON A PONY PHOTOGRAPHS!

DistrictCommodores... "On the "Front Lines"

There are 56 District Commodore positions available in IASYC; one for each state, including Alaska and Hawaii, plus international territories such as Puerto Rico; and foreign countries including Canada (Quebec and Ontario provinces), Panama, Mexico, Germany and the Philippines.

(The term District Commodore is a bit misleading in that the position is actually an ambassadorial post limited to Temple Centers within a given state. It is public relations in nature, as we do not interfere in any way with the direct function of any Shrine Yacht Club or Mariner unit. We perform our activities solely as a "service function").

So, suppose you had just volunteered to become a District Commodore. Here are some of the questions you might ask:

What would your duties be?

First, it is vitally important that you gather as much information regarding the status of each Yacht Club and/or Mariner unit within your state as possible. How many members are there in each club? How many of the club's members also belong to IASYC? Which clubs are active and which are in need of assistance? Should a temple in your state not currently have a yacht club, is the temple interested in starting one? How do members who have joined IASYC perceive our organization? Once you have gathered such basic data, you need to try to find and appoint shriners who would be willing to assume the responsibilities of a club/unit Port Captain. In most states it is not practicable to assume you will be able to travel frequently to visit with these clubs/units. You will have to develop a cadre of men who can be on location to communicate directly with members of their own club/unit.

How long would your tour of duty last?

Each new IASYC Commodore reserves the right to select and approve staff positions when he assumes office. Traditionally, except in unusual circumstances, a new Commodore is grateful for having an experienced staff organization already functioning well, and seldom makes staff changes.

How much of my time would it take?

It has been our experience that most spend about one or two days a month, depending on the number of clubs/units within his respective state. Obviously, if you are in a state with few Temple Centers, you are not going to spend as much time as someone with more. If there are no yacht clubs and you set about trying to establish new ones, it's going to take more time.

It's really up to you because if you want to become more intimately involved with your Port Captains now and want to visit each club/unit and, perhaps, speak to them regarding IASYC activities, then more time will be spent now than later.

To whom would you report?

A District Commodore reports to the Regional Ambassador, who in turn reports to the IASYC Fleet Captain. Frequently, all work together as a team to help promote IASYC projects to specific Temples.

So, if you think you are dedicated enough to "man up", contact Ray Desrochers, IASYC Fleet Captain today!

Our next issue will highlight the

duties of the Port Captain.



We begin this series with an historian, Robert K. Stanley (Al Koran), who resides in Bethel Park, PA (Bob was IASYC Commodore in 1998-1999).



A PERSONAL VIEW OF THE REENACTMENT OF THE BATTLE OF LAKE ERIE

Fifty years before Gettysburg, the victorious Battle of Lake Erie on September 1, 1813, changed the course of American History. Had the British been victors in the naval battle, they would have controlled Lake Erie, Lake Huron, Lake Michigan and Lake Superior, and the strongholds in the states we know today as Michigan, Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana and Minnesota. Our country as we know it today would have looked vastly different, but it was not to be. With Perry's Victory, the western expansion that one day would take Americans to the Pacific Ocean was about to start.

The reenactment of the Battle of Lake Erie was the brainchild of Dave Zavagino, who was Chairman of the Perry Group's Bicentennial Committee. Working along with Dave, was the S.National Park System, The Perry Group from Put-in-Bay, Ohio, and hundreds of local volunteers and businesses. It took over three years and tens of thousands of man hours that were put into this once in a lifetime live historical presentation. It gave me the opportunity to be my Great-Great-Great Grandfather Samuel McKinney for one day on the Brig Niagara. Samuel McKinney was a private in the 147th Pennsylvania Militia from Centre County who volunteered his service to fight the British in Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry's Lake Erie Squadron.

Throughout the Labor Day weekend, there were countless activities in which to take part. There was a reenactment village with military demonstrations by the 2nd Kentucky Militia and tribal life of the Black Swamp Intertribal Re-enactors. The U.S. Navy Band performed on a daily basis. There was a parade of boats, tours of the U.S. Brig Niagara or cruises on the Tall Ships Windy from Chicago, Illinois, or Halie & Matthew from Eastport, Maine. If you just wanted plain rest and relaxation, all you had to do was sit down on a bench and watch the world go by.

Using the passenger count on both the Jet Express and the Miller Boat line, over 50,000 persons travelled from the north coast of Ohio to Put-in-Bay from Friday, August 30 to Labor Day. It was noted to be the largest crowd ever to be on South Bass Island.

On Sunday, September 1, the Ohio State Marching Band arrived on the island on Miller Boat Lines largest ferry boat. They came off the boat playing and marching through the Village of Put-in-Bay until they reached the plaza of the Perry's Victory and International Peace Memorial. That evening they performed an outdoor concert at the plaza with the finale being, of course, Tchaikovsky's 1812 overture complete with cannon fire and followed by a forty-five minute firework extravaganza!

At dawn on Labor Day, we awoke to a gray chilly wind swept Lake Erie. Before we boarded the tall ships, all 557 re-enactors mustered one final time to go over the logistics of the day. Then it was off to the docks and get ready to sail. Along with the 17 tall ships, there were over 500 pleasure boats containing over 10,000 people on these pleasure boats that were on Lake Erie to watch the reenactment. By the time we reached the actual battle site, which was located by a buoy not far from West sister Island, the weather had changed. The clouds parted; the winds died down; and a beautiful warm sun had shown upon us all. While looking up in the sky during the battle, we had witnessed a World War II B17 and a B25 fly over us.

As we did two hundred years ago, we fought the British and once again we were the victors and I stood on the deck of the Brig Niagara as my Great-Great-Great-Grandfather did two hundred years ago.

A final thought. Because of our victory, it was the first time in British Naval History that an entire British Royal Navy Squadron was captured or sunk by the opposing Navy.




