



### Reports from the Bridge

### IASYC Rear Commodore Bill Kennedy

For many years I've been a member (and a Director) of the Tidewater Chapter of ACBS (Antique and Classic Boat Society) and receive copies of their annual research projects. This past year ACBS released the results of a national questionnaire and many of the questions and answers are not, perhaps, unlike what might be similar if duplicated by IASYC. For example:

# Q: "What do you believe the overall "image" of the ACBS to be?

A: Positive, old boy's club, east coast snobs, elitist, not responsive, stodgy, not connected, stuffy, improving, too laid back, neutral image, needs to be reenergized, unknown to general public, favorable, fun, friendly, good image but perceived to be for older people.

# Q: What can ACBS and your chapter do to better attract and retain more members?

A. Recruit people who are interested even if they don't own boat, get new members involved immediately, address retention issues, give out free items (key chains), at shows, personal contacts, be friendlier, increase community presence, "bring a ray of sunshine", find local discounts/benefits, increase personnel contacts, make special invitations to families and retirees, focus on youth, "loan" an officer from a successful chapter, provide a manual on "How To".

# Q: What do you believe is the most important ACBS membership benefit offered?

A: Insurance, camaraderie, learning about other chapters, database, Directory, Symposium, clearinghouse, community provide social structure, travel to unusual places, knowledge, workshops, videos, connections.

The Survey was four pages long and loaded with ideas from their membership, ideas that we can certainly consider for our own organization. Over the next couple of years, as we fill out our table of organization, we would hope that we have not only the man power to successfully execute, but, also, the will power to follow through.

### "THE KAYLA LEE FROM BLUE GRASS TO GRAND BAYOU!"

(Dedicated to my father-George Horn)

"My experiences on the river began at an early age. I remember our first wooden boat as being twelve foot long with a front deck and windshield. The maintenance of a boat back then was much different than today. The first winter, we turned that old wooden boat upside down and fiberglassed the bottom. I often wonder, was that our first fiberglass boat?

"My father taught me the "River Book" at a young age. The "River Book" lies in the corner of father's great mind. It is not a book to be read and discarded. This is a book to pass on from generation to generation. It is full of knowledge and each chapter has a new story to tell. Throughout my life, there has never been one mile on the river without interest. As you sit and enjoy the sunset, you will discover that each sunset is magnificent. Each sunset is as beautiful yet different than the day before.

"As you turn the pages of the book, you discover that the sun means that there will be wind tomorrow. A floating log means the river is rising and those tumbling boils show a changing bar or channel. My father passed the "River Book" to me. I will carry it around forever. It is part of me and I will pass the

Book to my son and friends adding new chapters of my own. Thanks Dad for your wisdom, an amazing trip of knowledge and a childhood that will not be forgotten."

#### Saturday, October 4, 2003

Towing Ms. Kayla behind, Bill and I departed Evansville, IN, 190 miles north of the Mississippi River. We camped out that night by the Ohio River near Paducah, KY. and the next day slipped the boat into the Ohio River at a ramp at Cairo, IL. [ It seems the river dropped during the night leaving a crust of mud on the trailer. Also, it seemed like the truck was saddened not to be going with us as it was slowly sliding down the ramp. However, we put "twigs" under the tires so that we could get the truck back up to the top of the ramp.] Our wives then took command of the truck and trailer and returned home. We would not see them again until they drove down to Venice, LA to meet us at the end of

On our first day on the Ohio River at Hickman, KY, our anxiety level was high as we entered the river with full fuel tanks, plenty of water under the keel and so much water around us. Today marked the beginning of a trip that would take us down the Mississippi 964 miles to Memphis, TN; Helena, AK; Greenville, MS; Vicksburg, MS; Natchez, MS; Baton Rouge, LA; New Orleans, LA; Chalmette, LA, and ending at Venice, LA.

As we closed in on Cairo, IL, the world suddenly seems much different even though we are only a few hundred yards off shore. There is heavy barge traffic and the sounds of tows dominate while pushing their loads upstream. I noticed that Bill's eyes are locked in on the shoreline. We are encountering strong cross currents leading into the Mississippi River. If you look closely you wonder, "Does the Ohio join the Mississippi, or does the Mississippi join the Ohio River?"

An exciting morning. Up and going at 7:00 a.m. It is Cold, cold - slipping out of my warm sleeping bag and my one room condo (tent). The temperature cropped 20-45 degrees last night. I guess I should say it is "Fresh"? Coffee is perfect with the cool morning and I did not have a problem with Bill's fire! Bill and I were asking ourselves over coffee, what will today bring? The water is great this morning, it's cool, it's rainy, but it's still a great morning to start a new adventure on the River!

After arriving at the New Madrid, MO City front, I realize we have a problem with the ignition switch. I remove the switch to check the connections. I call Lynn, a friend who is a Mercury dealer at home. I followed his instructions and now we're off and running again. I am very thankful for cell phones and most important that signal bar (Noah should have had one).

While transferring fuel from cans to our main fuel tank at the New Madrid city waterfront, a city police car is waiting for us on top of the hill. We asked if there is a gas station in the area. Officer Dale Hampton gives us a choice: walking two miles or he will give us a ride to a nearby station. We surely appreciated his assistance. I should mention, I start searching for fuel after we transfer fuel from our cans to our main tank. I prefer not to ask someone to make more than one trip for fuel.

For several hours the day is sunny with calm water and not many towboats. This changes late in the afternoon. We are back in rainy , windy conditions again. We are seeing a change in the currents. At mile 782, Chickasaw Bluff light the channel changers to the left descending bank and buoys. At this time I am starting to get concerned with a triscrew which looks like an aircraft carrier fast approaching us in the turn.

"LimeStone Lady; a triscrew, four deck tug boat, pushing 42 barges upstream, on the "Big Muddy".

"One by one, it looks like the channel buoys are disappearing as the currents are pulling them under water. We do not have sea room outside the buoys to run in good water. The buoys are near the wing dams with not over a foot of water passing over them. It first startles me as the wind and rain swept over the deck and the boils are churning the water like nothing we have encountered before. We proceed with caution and pass the tows very close. The lower Mississippi river is much different than the upper Miss. Or the Ohio River. You're always asking yourself what's around the next bend? At mm 770 we turn into a creek to stay away from the driver current and tow boats for the night. With the threat of more bad weather, we make camp well within the trees for protection from the winds. Today we t raveled in a lot of rain. Dinner is tasty; again, we carry a supple of MREs

### Monday, October 6, 2003...Where's Memphis?

**Another great morning!** We spent the night at the Hill Top Inn (I like to name our campsites). I could be wrong, but I think we were the first men to set foot on that hill.

In the middle of the night I was awakened by the sounds of Coyotes. As I lay there in the tent thinking, "I'm glad I have a pistol, which was, of course, in the boat!" I hear two Hoot Owls reminding me that we are just visiting the hill. After a very light breakfast we broke camp and loaded the gear in the Kayla Lee. We are back on the river again. After studying the state maps and charts, I found no place to locate fuel. I approached a Tri-screw pushing 42 barges up stream. I contacted him on the radio about a location for fuel. The Captain asked how many gallons we needed and if we have containers? He instructed me to pull on #2 and pass the cans to his deck hands. With great caution, we proceed along the side of the LimeStone Lady which the captain continued to push up stream. The waves are beginning to come up over the bow of the Kayla Lee at the time. I'm glad she's selfbailing as Bill didn't seem too much concerned until the water started passing over his ankles. I explained later that he should have taken advantage of the situation and used soap on his feet. If people inland were like people on the river, the world would be much different today. Thanks again to LimeStone Lady!

It's a pleasure to cruise the river today as the water is like a piece of glass. The river is wide, lined with beautiful tall trees and it is remarkably quiet. We each agree that today, for the first time since the trip began we feel truly relaxed and in-tune with life on the river.

We arrive at the Memphis Yacht Club at Mud Island Marina at 3:00 p.m. And are greeted by harbormaster Roy Smith. We fuel up and Bill and I exchange river stories for several hours with the MYC members. I was presented with a MYC flag for the Kayla Lee

to fly to New Orleans. Lee, who also works at the club, gives us a ride off Mud Island on a pontoon boat to the downtown area They call ahead and make reservations at the Bar M 870. We are setting up camp well before darkness. This gives us plenty of time to enjoy the sunset. Just before sunset, a flock of white pelicans passed by the island flying low over the water. In addition, a sternwheeler was slowly working its way up stream on the far side of the river. I should mention, food is not a problem. We have a supply of (MRE) meals ready to eat. This is a great ending for this day! It seems the river is dropping as I've changed the lines twice since pulling into the island. It's much different on the lower Mississippi River because there are no damns to call for the river change. We traveled 125 miles today and saw one fishing boat at Hickman. You are very much alone on the lower Mississippi river. At this time, Bill's long gone enjoying his river condo and the silent night. I have a fire to write by and it seems to be telling me something as it gets smaller. What a great night...until tomorrow.

Tuesday, October 7, 2003

This would have been an excellent morning to sleep in. I'm sleeping on clean sheets and a comfortable mattress again, but not for long. Bill has me up at 5:00 a.m. He's already thinking about the old Miss. I continue to remind Bill that Mississippi means "Father of the Waters", since Bill is my senior. His enthusiasm may be because he misses our usual first mates and wives Kayla and Jean. They would prefer a trip aboard the senior Kayla Lee, our 3880 Bayliner.

The staff is not at the marina this time of morning. We call a taxi. It is an enjoyable trip to Mud Island and the marina. Our driver is an older gentleman born and raised in Memphis. After a short time, he is laughing and asks "Do you need a crew member?" If you think we can tell stories at the yacht club, you should have heard this conversation!
